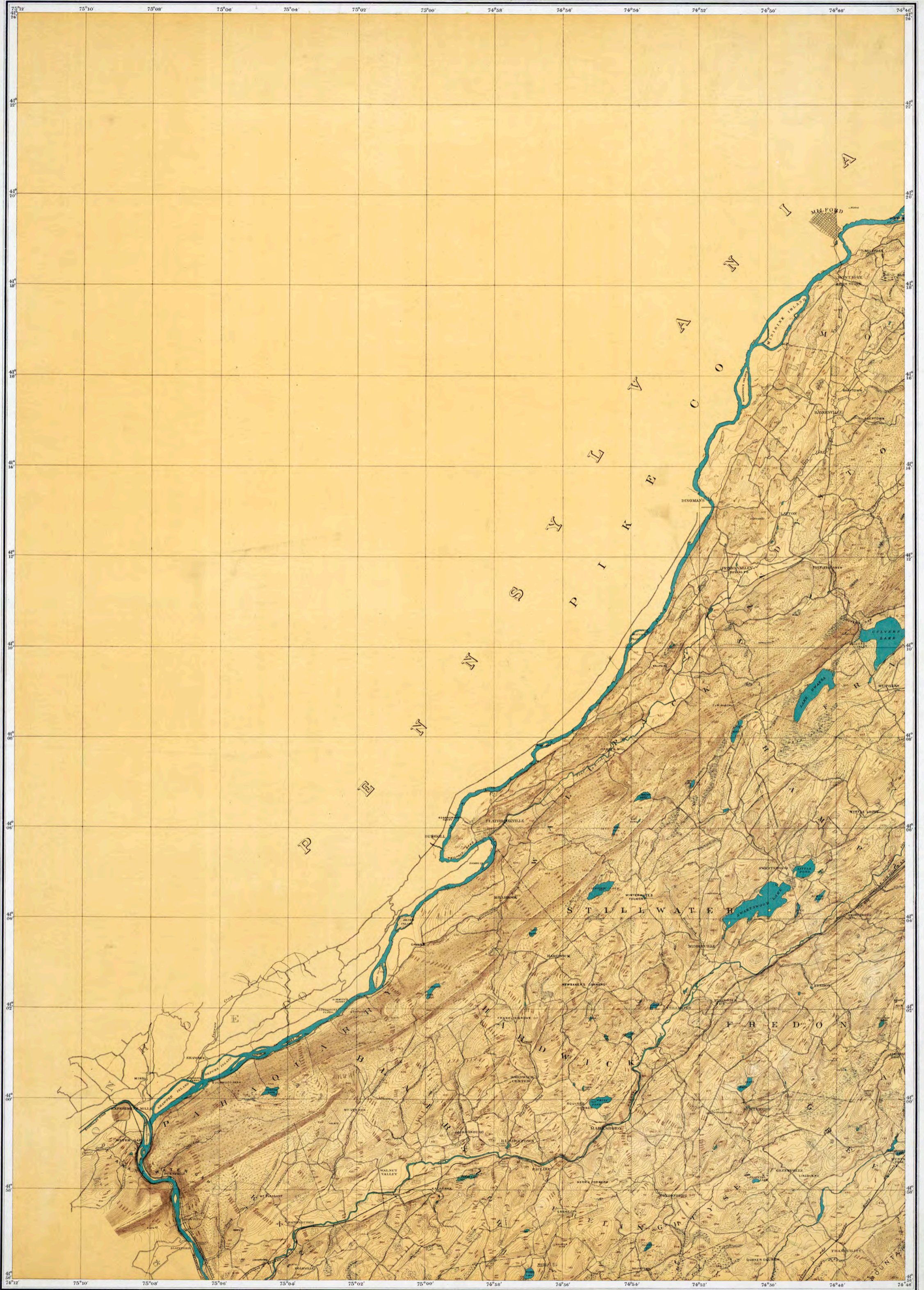

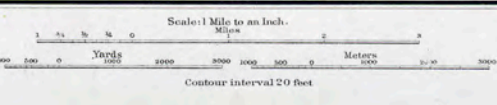

NOTE. The curved lines are level lines drawn on the earth's surface. All points through which are given the same elevation are at the same level and their height above mean sea level is shown by the figures on the line. The rise of feet from any line to the next is as the figure will show to feet, figures not on any line show the actual elevation of the surface at a point indicated by a small cross.



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
